Prolixin (fluphenazine) basics



Treats schizophrenia and psychosis. Prolixin (fluphenazine) can stabilize your mood. It is used to find the right dose for you before moving to a long-acting injection.



Tips from pharmacists

- Can make you more sensitive to the sun. Wear sunscreen or protective clothing while outside.
- Can make it difficult for you to start and stop your movements. Talk to your doctor right away if this happens.
- Don't combine with alcohol or narcotics since it can stop your breathing.
- Don't stop taking Prolixin (fluphenazine) suddenly. It can be dangerous.
- Can make you very sleepy or dizzy. Don't drive or do anything that requires concentration until you know how it affects you.
- Mix the concentrated form with at least 1/4 cup of fluids. Don't mix with caffeine, tea, or apple juice since it affects the absorption of Prolixin (fluphenazine).

Risks and warnings

The FDA has identified these as possible serious or life-threatening risks with this medication. Contact your doctor if you experience any of these.

Increased risk of death

Older people with dementia and psychosis have a higher risk of death if they take antipsychotic medicines like Prolixin (fluphenazine). They shouldn't be given this medicine.

Difficulty controlling movements

Prolixin (fluphenazine) may make it more difficult to control your movements, especially if you've been on it for a while. This can become permanent. Call your doctor right away if this happens.

Neuroleptic malignant syndrome

Antipsychotic medications like Prolixin (fluphenazine) can cause neuroleptic malignant syndrome which is rare but lifethreatening. Symptoms include a very high fever, sweating, stiff muscles, and a fast or irregular heartbeat. Call your doctor or 911 right away.
